ABRAM-WOLFE RECITAL TONIGHT

Tonight at 8 p.m. in the Music Room pianist Jacques Abram and New College music professor Paul Wolfe will present a sonata recital for students, faculty, and guests. On the program are three works: Sonata in C major by Mozart, Sonata in A major by Caesar Franck, and "Kreutzer" Sonata by Beethoven. The recital was originally planned as a part of the Humanities music section, but due to an injury to Mr. Abram's hand was postponed.

Professor Wolfe is also the conductor of the Florida West Coast Symphony and the Youth Orchestra and director of the Asolo Chamber Orchestra. He participates each year in the Casals Festival in Puerto Rico as one of the leading violinists and official harpsichordist.

Mr. Abram is a professor of piano at the University of South Florida. He has appeared with more than seventy-eight major symphony orchestras in North and South America and Europe. He has planned a tour of Holland and Scandinavia and a recording of four concerti with the Vienna Philharmonic.

The program of musical performances was made possible through a special gift from Mrs. Lota C. Murphy.

FINE ARTS INSTITUTE WORK ON DISPLAY

Paintings of the New College Fine Arts Institute are now on display at the Ringling Museum. The show opened April 5, and will continue until April 22.

Paintings of the faculty members Conrad Marca Relli, Balcomb Greene, James Brooks, and Syd Solomon are exhibited at the entrance to the museum.

GIRL'S DORM SCIENCE LAB NEXT WEEK

With the exception of six girls, New College has moved into its new dorms. Three are still in the science lab in one of the small rooms. The other three are living off-campus. They will move into the B₂ court after the 15th.

The lab is being cleaned, tiles fixed in preparation for the arrival of lab furniture from storage early next week.

Captain Ralph Styles expressed his appreciation for the cooperation most students have shown both in understanding the delay in moving and moving into unfinished rooms.

Captain Styles plans to have a music practice room and a linen room in the A court after the girls move into the B court. Washer, dryers, vending machines (including an ice machine) will be added also, probably in one of the small construction buildings. More bicycle racks have been ordered. The pay telephone will begin by Friday.

Moving on to the Crane Property, Captain Styles said that bids will be taken soon for a commercial, guaranteed roof for the male house. Students will be able to do the other work needed. Furniture is being donated by various people in the community.

The student work is situated in Gallery 18. Among the students of the Institute are Eric Hazelhoff and David Rollow. Eric's painting is an intriguing one entitled "Wombat". David's painting "Rocks Coming Down" is a complex arrangement of forms with an interesting blend of colors.

Student-Faculty Committee Report

On Friday, April 2 at 2pm the newly elected student members of the Student-Faculty Committee met to begin preliminary discussions regarding the structure that it will present to the New College Community at the end of the Second Independent Study Period. For the moment, discussion was limited to the method of the Committee's operation. Dan Jaecks was the only absent member.

It was decided that all meetings would be open to the student body at large and would be held at 1pm, Tuesdays in the South Room. A date convenient to the Faculty members for joint meeting is yet to be set up.

Chuck Hamilton was elected Chairman of the committee. Anna Navarro was elected recording and corresponding secretary.

It was decided that minutes should be published in the Catalyst.

The Committee will meet as a body with the new Academic Dean (Monday the 5th) and at that time request that it would be in order to appoint or elected new faculty members.

It was suggested that Dr. French's ability to formulate questionnaires be used occasionally by the Committee to sample New College Community opinion regarding specific issues under discussion.

It was agreed that investigations would be made of the organization and structure employed in other colleges, with particular attention to the problems contingent to each.

It was suggested and agreed upon that as a point of departure for organization the Committee would write to Faculty, Administration and Staff members and ask for a brief statement of what they

considered to be their area of responsibility, interest, and authority.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:30pm.

On Monday, April 5 the student members of the Student-Faculty Committee met with Dean Eurich. The students gave a chronological account of the various committees that have been elected by the student body, their functions, and decisions.

The present position of the Multipurpose Committee and the Student-Faculty Committee was delineated. (preceptual)

The Dean suggested that two important ideas be kept in mind in the formulation of any proposals for structure: Simplicity and provision for change.

The Dean made clear that her position was one of an "academic coordinator" and that her main concern was that of insuring excellence in curricular matters, though she would be available for consultation in other matters if approached.

As an aside to this factual account of the meeting: Dr. Eurich impressed us as a most capable person who thoroughly understands the college, its problems and its aspirations and whose interest is the welfare of the college as a whole as opposed to the forwarding of the interests of any particular segment of it.
